







Cancer Health Justice Lab: The way forward to mentoring, training, education, and service

Background

In collaboration with California State University (CSU) East Bay, New Jersey Medical School (NJMS), and Rutgers School of Public Health, the Cancer Health Justice Lab (CHJL) was developed to:

- Raise awareness of health inequity issues affecting medically underserved and hidden populations
- Provide a support network of mentoring, training, and service for underrepresented students and professionals in medicine and public health

Methods

CHJL recruits 2-4 undergraduate interns per semester from local academic and pipeline programs:

- Northeast Regional Alliance (NERA) HCOP Academy
 Program
- Edward J. Bloustein School of Planning and Public Policy

Interns engage in:


- Didactic training on social determinants of health
- Experiential training on social determinants of health

Generated seven peer-reviewed articles in the past year


Produced Cancer 101 videos and a short video on COVID-19 for Spanish speakers






Interviewed 22 prospective interns between the Fall 2020 and Spring 2021 semesters

Conclusion

CHJL's multidisciplinary approach can:

- Increase diversity in the health-related workforce
- Increase the contributions of historically underrepresented groups to science
- Educate the next generation of health-related professionals
- Reduce social isolation and feelings of otherness that may contribute to health inequities
